

STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS IN PROFESSIONAL NURSING PROGRAMS

This update presents information for the 130 pre-licensure registered nursing (RN) programs in Texas during the 2023 reporting year, including:

- 1 diploma program;
- 69 Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) programs, including 57 generic ADN programs and 12 licensed vocational nurse (LVN) to ADN stand-alone programs;
- 58 Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs; and
- 2 Master of Science in Nursing Alternate Entry (MSN AE) programs.

The Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) collected data using the 2023 Board of Nursing's (BON) Nursing Education Program Information Survey (NEPIS) that was available online as of October 2, 2023. The reporting period was academic year (AY) 2022-2023 (September 1, 2022 – August 31, 2023) unless otherwise noted. TCNWS collaborated with the BON in the design and dissemination of the survey.

In previous years, student demographics have been reported for both newly enolled students and graduates. In 2023, data collection related to student demographics was limited to graduates in order to ease survey burden.

Graduates from Professional Nursing Programs

Gender


In 2023, there were 14,964 graduates from professional nursing programs. This population was predominantly female: 85.4% in AY 2022-2023, which was comparable to the proportion of females in AY 2021-2022 (85.1%). Gender data were missing for 0.1% of RN graduates.

Age

Figure 1 illustrates the AY 2022-2023 RN graduate breakdown by age. Age data were missing for 0.2% of RN graduates.

- The largest proportion of graduates was between 21 and 25 years of age (45.7%).
- The second largest age group was graduates aged 31-40 years (21.8%), followed by 26-30 years (21.3%). Graduates aged 41 and older made up 9.6% of RN graduates.
- BSN programs had the largest proportion of graduates who were 25 or younger (61.7% of BSN graduates).
- 64.6% of LVN to ADN graduates were 31 years of age or older.

Race/Ethnicity

Figure 2 displays the race/ethnicity distribution of RN graduates in comparison to the race/ethnicity distribution of the RN workforce and the projected 2023 Texas population. Race/ethnicity data were missing for 2.0% of RN graduates.

- The percentage of RN graduates who were White/Caucasian (38.6%) was only slightly less than the 2023 Texas population (39.6%) and less than that of the 2023 RN workforce (51.6%). The percentage of RN White/Caucasian graduates more closely (than ever) reflects the percentage of White/Caucasian persons in the Texas population. In 2022, the percentage of RN graduates who were White/Caucasian was 41.3%, while the percentage of White/Caucasian persons in the Texas population was 40.0%.
- The percentage of Black/African American RN graduates (13.5%) was similar to the percentage of Black/African American persons in the 2023 Texas population (12.1%) and the percentage within the 2023 RN workforce (13.4%).
- The proportion of RN graduates who were Hispanic/Latino (34.2%) was lower than the proportion of Hispanics/Latinos in the 2023 Texas population (40.3%), but greater than the proportion of Hispanic/Latino nurses in the 2023 RN workforce (20.1%).
- The percentage of Asian RN graduates (8.5%) was greater than the percentage of Asian individuals in the 2023 Texas population (5.6%), but lower than the 2023 RN workforce (12.1%).
- There were greater percentages of RN graduates (5.1%) in the "other" race/ethnicity category than the proportion within the Texas population (2.3%).





Figure 3. Race/Ethnicity of RN Graduates, 2014-2023

Figure 3 shows the race/ethnicity trends of RN graduates from 2014 to 2023. The proportion of RN graduates who were White/Caucasian has dropped while the percentage of students who were Hispanic/Latino, Black/African American, Asian or "other" races has risen. RN graduates are better reflecting the race/ethnicity distribution of the Texas population and this distribution should begin to be reflected in the RN workforce.

Figure 2. Race/Ethnicity of RN Graduates, Texas RN Workforce, and Texas Population

International Students 3

Programs reported a total of 226 graduates who were international students (1.5% of all RN graduates). This proportion has remained relatively consistent with past years.
