Children's Eye Health and Safety Month

The National Institutes of Health <u>National Eye Institute (NEI)</u> observes August as Children's Eye Health and Safety Month. National Immunization Awareness Month

The <u>Centers of Disease Control and Prevention</u> (CDC) recognizes August as <u>National</u> <u>Immunization Awareness Month</u> (NIAM). Incorporating Updated Asthma Guidelines in Clinical Care Webinar

The <u>DSHS Asthma Program</u> is hosting an online webinar on August 9th from 12:00PM to 1:00PM that will cover how clinicians can incorporate the updated asthma guidelines into their clinical care. Hear from pediatricians and pediatric pulmonologists in Texas on the latest asthma guidelines from the <u>National Heart</u> <u>Lung and Blood Institute</u>, <u>Global Initiative for Asthma</u>, and <u>American Academy of Pediatricians</u>. <u>Registration</u> is open.

Funding Opportunities

EPA 2023 Clean School Bus Grant Program

The <u>U.S. Environmental Protection Agency</u> has announced the <u>2023 Clean School</u> <u>Bus Grant Program</u>. The program consists of \$400 million in grant funding available to eligible applicants nationwide. The program helps in the purchase of zeroemission school buses, clean school buses and zero-emission charging infrastructure. Applications which aim to replace buses serving high-need local education agencies, rural areas, tribal school districts and public-school districts receiving basic support payments will be prioritized. Applications are due by August 22, 2023.

Health Education

Online Vaping Prevention and Education Resource Center

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's <u>Center for Tobacco Products (CTP)</u> launched the <u>Vaping Prevention and Education Resource Center</u>, which provides free science-based, standards-mapped resources that teachers can use to help their students understand the dangers associated with vaping and nicotine addiction. CTP also developed free materials for parents to help them understand and recognize vapes, talk with their children, and keep the conversation going over time. Students can read real-life stories and relatable content to help them understand vaping, nicotine addiction, common myths about vapes, and how to say no to vaping.

Turn To Campaign

The <u>Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC)</u> launched the <u>`Turn To'</u> substance use prevention media campaign in collaboration with <u>FleishmanHillard</u> and <u>The University of Texas' Center for Health Communication</u>. HHSC will be hosting various back-to-school events, including dynamic activities, distribution of back-to-school supplies, and sharing resources in support of mental health and wellbeing and prevention of substance use and related issues. Move Your Way Campaign

The Great Garden Detective Adventure Curriculum

The United States Department of Agriculture <u>Team Nutrition</u> created <u>The Great</u> <u>Garden Detective Adventure: A Standards-Based Gardening Nutrition Curriculum for</u> <u>Grades 3 and 4</u>. Discover what fruits and vegetables are sweetest, crunchiest, and juiciest through a series of investigations and fun experiences connecting the school garden to the classroom, school cafeteria, and home. Materials include bulletin board materials, veggie dice, fruit and vegetable flash cards, and ten issues of Garden Detective News for parents/caregivers.

Clean Hands and Spaces Web-Based Training

The <u>CDC</u> offers free continuing education credit to those who complete the <u>Clean</u> <u>Hands and Spaces Web-Based Training</u>. This training is available through the Texas TRAIN website. The training is meant for school nurses and other professionals. Participants will gain information and strategies for keeping hands and surfaces clean in educational settings. Begin the academic year with healthy habits and practices to keep the whole school community thriving. The <u>Minnesota Department of Health Asthma Program</u> is offering a <u>free online course</u> for community coaches. The course takes 35-minutes and gives coaches the tools they need to appropriately respond to an asthma attack.
