School Health Program Website Updates

January is National Radon Action Month

The <u>Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)</u> recognizes January as National Radon Action Month. Motivational Interviewing Course

<u>Texas Health and Human Services</u> has updated its Texas Health Steps <u>Motivational</u> <u>Interviewing course</u>. This course provides free continuing education credits and can help providers and other professionals gain communication skills that can be used to motivate children, adolescents, and families to make positive health changes, improve self-care for chronic conditions, and avoid high-risk behaviors.

Staying Safe: School Safety Response Training

The <u>Texas School Safety Center</u> is offering a new <u>curriculum</u> developed in partnership with <u>Safe and Sound Schools</u> and <u>Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid</u> <u>Response Training (ALERRT)</u>. The curriculum includes a variety of age-level and ability-level school safety options learners can use during an active event. Safe and Sound Schools' curriculum and ALERRT's Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) will be offered throughout the spring as a six-hour train-the-trainer session for all regional Education Service Centers. Reaching for Excellence Grant

<u>Texas DSHS</u> invites public and charter schools to apply for the <u>Reaching for</u> <u>Excellence (RFE) in Texas School Health Grant</u>. Two \$10,000 grants will be awarded for the 2024-2025 school year. The goal of the RFE grant is to fund projects that inspire students to live healthier lives. Projects must focus on at least one key component of the <u>Whole School</u>, <u>Whole Community</u>, <u>Whole Child model</u>. Oliver Foundation Healthy Choices Grants

The <u>Oliver Foundation's</u> goal is to encourage children, families, and communities in Texas to improve eating and physical activity patterns. The Oliver Foundation has several Healthy Choices grants available for schools ranging from \$750 to \$5,000. Physical activity and nutrition education components are required for the grants. Supporting Community Agriculture and Local Education Systems (Project SCALES)

The <u>U.S Department of Agriculture</u> and the <u>Center for School and Community</u> <u>Partnerships at Boise State University</u> are requesting applications for <u>Supporting</u> <u>Community Agriculture and Local Education Systems (Project SCALES)</u> with a goal to support innovation to increase the use of locally sourced foods and beverages in school meals. SCALES will be issuing up to 70 grants to School Food Authorities across the United States. Grants will last for two years and provide up to \$150,000 for each SFA to engage in projects to increase local procurement. Applications are due by January 26, 2024, at 11:59pm ET. Texas Say What! Action Summit Registration

Texas A&M Health Opioid Task Force Resources
